

Tackling child labour in our cocoa supply chain

Child labour is a global problem.









73 million of these children are between **5 and 11** years old

At Nestlé we believe child labour has no place in our supply chain.

We know there are children working on farms in Côte d'Ivoire in areas where we source cocoa.

No company sourcing cocoa here can guarantee they've eliminated the risk of children working in their supply chain, but we are determined to tackle the problem.

"The use of child labour in our cocoa supply chain goes against everything we stand for," José Lopez, Nestlé Executive Vice-President for Operations.

We're the first cocoa buyer to set up a child labour monitoring and remediation system




Farmers Sell the cocoa they produce to




